Tell Someone Posters - Quick Guide

Thank you for sharing the Tell Someone posters. These posters are an important tool to help children, young people, and adults access support about child sexual abuse and grooming safely and easily.

Why are there three types of posters?

There are two versions for children and young people and one version for adults. You can tell the children and young people posters apart by the Kids Helpline logo in the bottom-left corner.

Where should the children and young people posters go?

Place these posters in spots where young people naturally pause and feel comfortable scanning a QR code. Examples include:

- Back of toilet doors
- Changing rooms
- Common areas or hang-out spaces

Where should the adult posters go?

The adult posters work best in places where adults spend a quiet moment or wait. Examples include:

- Kitchen or staff rooms
- Reception areas or waiting rooms
- Noticeboards in common areas
